These challenges can lead to fracture and isolation, to turning away from each other instead of coming together, and leaving the most vulnerable behind. But change will only come if we turn outward instead of inward, to our friends, our communities and our planet.

Art for Tomorrow 2025 is about tapping into this shared humanity to learn about creative solutions to the most entrenched problems. This May 12-14, we will convene influential figures from the arts, design and architecture in Milan, to explore the impact that these fields can and do have on society.

The iconic building of the Triennale Milano, where this year's event will be hosted, is the perfect setting in which to consider contemporary challenges. Art for Tomorrow is proud to be collaborating with both Triennale Milano, which will present the 24th International Exhibition titled "Inequalities" from May 13 to November 9, and Milan Art Week, taking place in April with the theme "Among Friends." Art for Tomorrow will take place right after the opening of the Venice Architecture Biennale, giving delegates the opportunity to take advantage of myriad critical events. We will also explore Milan's vibrant cultural landscape, venturing into museums, performance spaces and design studios to see the arts in action.
